The First Reading

Genesis 32:22-31

The same night Jacob got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. Jacob was left alone; and a person wrestled with Jacob until daybreak. When the person saw that they did not prevail against Jacob, they struck Jacob on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as they wrestled. Then the person said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." So they said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." Then the person said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed." Then Jacob asked them, "Please tell me your name." But they said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there the person blessed Jacob. So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved." As for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of Christ appearing and Christ's kindom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

The Gospel Luke 18:1-8

Presider The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Luke. People Glory to you, O Christ.

Jesus told his disciples a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, 'Grant me justice against my opponent.' For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, 'Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming.'" And the Savior said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to God's chosen ones who cry out to God day and night? Will the Holy One delay long in helping them? I tell you, God will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Humanity comes, will he find faith on earth?"

The Nicene Creed

The Nicene Creed is the historic statement of faith of the Church. It helps to knit the Church together across peoples and places, time and space. We pray it together as a single body, a member of the one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God, begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father;
through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven,
was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary
and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. For in these last days you sent Jesus to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In Christ, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In Christ, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.



So when you [the Parish of St. Paul] offer sanctuary to another, the whole Body of Christ is made more whole. Supporting the Centre Street Food Pantry -- Sunday, October 26

From parishioner Margaret Hummel: It's time to contribute to the Centre Street Food Pantry over the next few weekends, with the **final collection taking place on Sunday, October 26.** Based out of Trinity Church, Newton Centre, the Centre Street Food Pantry currently serves 200 households a week. It's particularly important this year, because the Greater Boston Food Bank, from which the pantry buys most of the food they distribute, has had its budget CUT by \$2.3 million by somebody in Washington.

Here's how the pantry describes itself: "The Centre Street Food Pantry provides families within our community with consistent access to nutritious food in a dignified, sensitive and inclusive environment. We are a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization."

Here's how to contribute:

If you want to give food, pick up a copy of the Kids Club Shopping List on the table at the back of church, and put the items in the big box at the back. To give money, write your check to either the pantry or to St. Paul's with a memo saying it is for the pantry. Or just put cash in an envelope (please designate it's for the pantry) in the collection plate.
